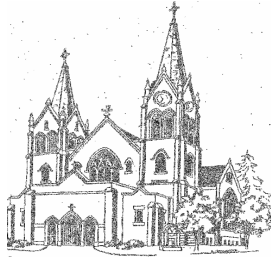

ST. PETER'S LUTHERAN SCHOOL NEWS

The first month of school for this year has gone quite well. We are pleased that we are again able to share Christ with so many children and families. 173 students are being served at this time.

During September we had volleyball games, cross country matches, School Shout Out with NBC Channel 15, school choirs again singing in church, a variety of field trips both to learn and to serve, and the list can go on. September was a busy month.

Now we are into October. We will again have a busy month. Volleyball will continue and will be completed by the end of the month. This will include several home and away games as well as 1 or 2 tournaments. We have also had several cross country meets that several of our students participated in. Our teachers will have another uplifting experience as they attend the Lutheran Education Association Conference which is held every 3 years. This will be held in Grand Rapids, Michigan. All of our teachers are registered and ready to go. The midterm of the 1st quarter happens in October. The second week of October also brings Fire Safety Week and visits to the fire station for the younger students and visits to our school by firemen to make sure that we have effective fire drills and our facility has no fire safety hazards.

We continue to have maintenance work done in our school. Realizing that our building is getting old, the first addition was built in the 1950's and the second addition was added in the 1960's, some things wear out and others just stop working. The biggest issue is trying to locate parts to fix things that are 60 to 70 years old. We have a wonderful facility that we are proud of and we work to keep it in good shape. In September we had plumbing and electrical issues as well as heating and cooling problems that we brought professionals in to work on.

Our annual Spaghetti Dinner Fundraiser will be held on October 28 this year. The only thing that is changing is the date. We will still have our silent auction which has become a very popular event. DONATIONS ARE WELCOME. The food will be as good as always. Wonderful bars and cookies that are supplied by school families and anyone else who would like to donate some, will be available as part of the meal. And we should not have any problems with the weather. So plan on coming. Tickets will be on sale in Concordia Hall following Sunday services during the month of October. Ticket sales will begin October 9.

On Thursday, September 22, the 6th, 7th and 8th grade students made a trip to Rock Springs. Due to the flooding of the Baraboo River, there was a need to move items from the library and city offices. Dave Dietz volunteered his time to drive the bus and the teachers and students gave their time and energy to move books, office equipment and whatever else they could to assist the Rock Springs community. This is wonderful thing about our American people that in time of need, we are there for each other.

As you are all probably aware, I am again serving as Principal of your school. I am honored to do this task. At the same time, as we look down the road, it is also important that the calling process is continued and a more permanent person be found, and the Lord has that person waiting in the wings, that will carry on as the leader of our school. The Lord is in charge and will direct the calling process. This we can be assured of.

Christ died for our sins, was buried, and rose again. If you believe this gospel, if you stand upon it, and cling to it, you are saved. Trust in this is the dividing line. It defines, either positively or negatively, all men. It separates and divides Cain from Abel, Job from his so-called friends, Abraham from Abimelech, Isaac from Ishmael, Jacob from Esau, David from Saul, Daniel from Belshazzar, Joseph from Herod, Lazarus from the rich man, and the tax collector from the Pharisee. What defines men is not whether they are good or bad, but whether or not they believe in Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of sins.

The problem with man is his heart. Our hearts are fallen and predisposed to think that we can impress God. We think that if we do all the right things God will reward us, and we will escape evil. We think that God will be impressed with our gifts, that our prosperity and goodness is evidence that God loves us or that it should motivate God to love us.

But we know better because God has blessed us with the faith of Abel, Job, and Abraham. We know that God's grace in Christ saves us, not our works.

We know that God is not impressed with our giving. He is not impressed when we give him that which is already his. God doesn't benefit from our giving and He doesn't need it. But our neighbor does need it. And God delights in us growing more and more like Him. He blesses us, and He invites us to bless one another with our giving: so that the Gospel may be proclaimed, so that the poor may be fed, so that all God's work through the Church may be done.

So consider God's priorities in comparison to your own. And be honest. Reevaluate where you are and where God has called you to be. Look into your own bank statement. Would

any accountant think that the Church was your priority? He would see a spreadsheet filled with where your money actually goes: into house and clothing and cars, into eating out and beauty supplies and entertainment. Indeed, much of it wasted on frivolous things. But would he find great percentages going to the church? Figure up the percentage. Put it in relation to the proportion of your income. What percentage of your income do you give for the mission of the church: the preaching and teaching, the baptizing and communing, the help for the weak and poor brothers of Christ? Is it even enough for a deduction when you file your income taxes? The widow gave all she had and thought nothing of it. She was glad to do it. The rich man gave what to him was meaningless, trifle amount and desired a plaque in his honor. Why is it that the less we give the prouder we are and the more credit we expect?

All your works, even your monetary gifts, done in faith please God now for Christ's sake. No matter how great or small, frequent or infrequent. They are all washed and cleansed by grace through faith on account of Christ. Whatever you do from faith in God pleases him for the sake of the Son. So reevaluate your generosity in the light of the grace of Christ. Freely you have received, freely give.

ORPHAN GRAIN TRAIN MINISTRY is a very special ministry that reaches out to help the needy in our country and across the world. This ministry operates on a fiscal year that begins on June 1 and ends on May 31. Following is a report on what this ministry did during the past year.

148 full shipments of relief supplies were shipped within the United States and to other countries. 58 semi-loads went to domestic locations and 90 (40 ft or longer), shipping containers went to destinations overseas. Orphan Grain Train shipped more than 4.6 million Mercy Meals and Kids Against Hunger meals and over 211,000 pounds of edible beans worldwide and in the United States. During the 2015-2016 Fiscal Year, Orphan Grain Train shipped to 22 different countries and 18 different states. 33 of those shipments came out of our Wisconsin Division and were shipped out of Westfield. These shipments went overseas to Kyrgyzstan, Philippines, Haiti, Lithuania, and Moldova. Domestic shipments went to several destinations in Texas and South Dakota.

The Orphan Grain Train ministry operates almost totally on volunteers and donations. Of every dollar donated, only 2.6 % is used for administrative and marketing costs. 97.4% goes to helping children and families around the world. Since this ministry began in 1992, OGT has helped people in 28 states and 65 different countries. Last year volunteers donated 88,075 hours. This is a value of \$792,671.41 at \$9 an hour.

Here at St. Peter's, we have over 20 volunteers each time we pack and sort donations that go to Westfield and then to where ever the need exists. Since beginning

here in Reedsburg in 2009, we have sorted and packed over 15,000 boxes of clothing and other donations and volunteered over 9070 hours.

We are blessed to be part of this wonderful ministry and we thank God for the opportunity to use our blessings to support others in our country and around the world.
